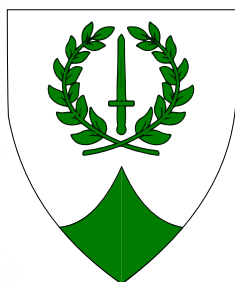

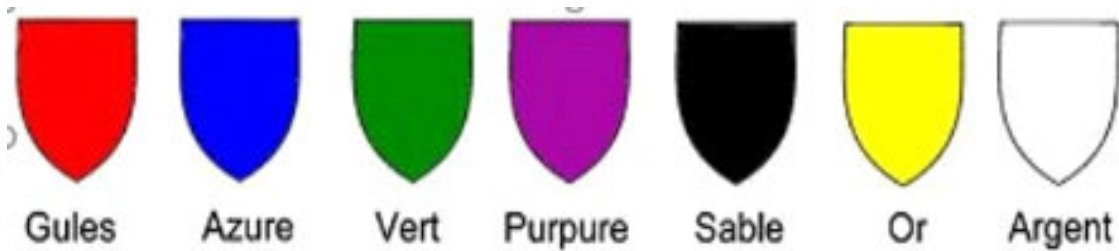

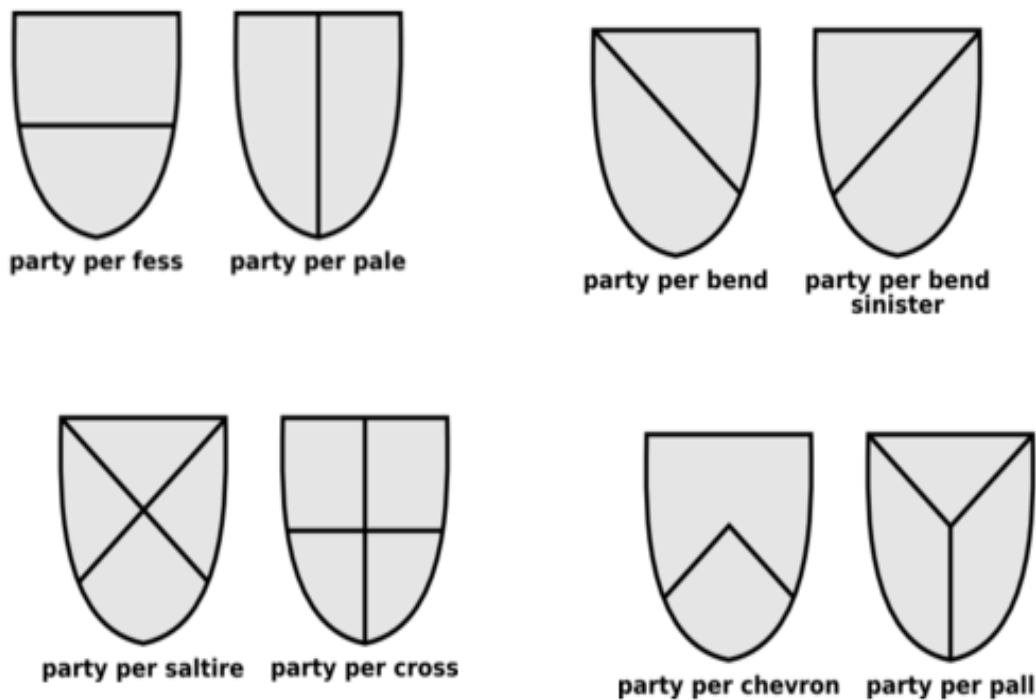

So, to start the main tinctures (colours) used by the SCA with Or and Argent considered metals.

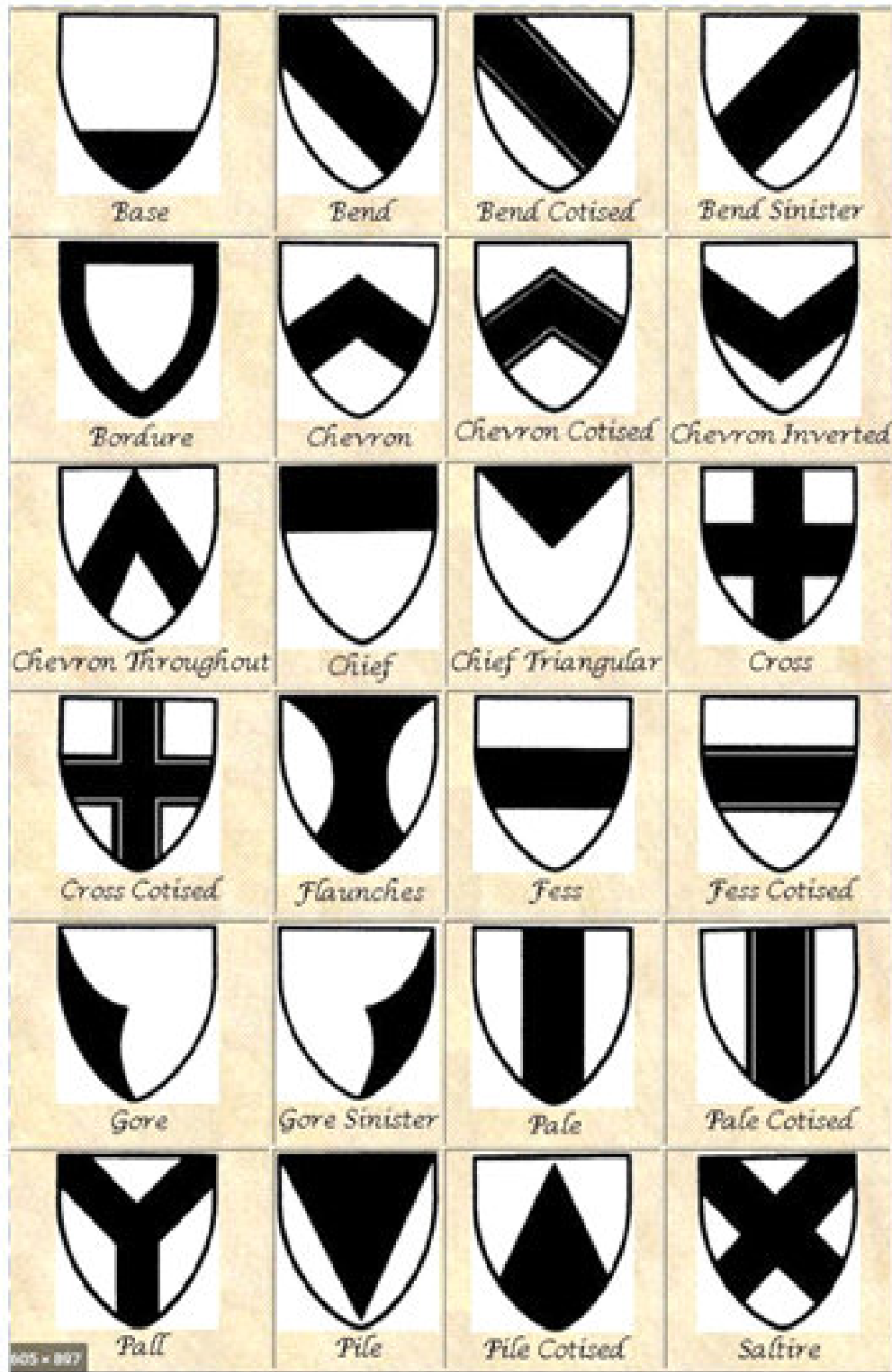


Here we see the main field divisions used by the SCA.

[Download Discord](#) to your device of choice, whether it be phone, tablet or desktop computer.

Access to the Lochac server is via the invite here:

<https://lochac.sca.org/discord> which you can click on to open in Discord, or put in your web browser.

If you're new to Discord, you'll need to pick a username – something that will help identify you to others in the Kingdom would be ideal. You will be able to [change this later](#), so don't worry about being stuck with what you choose. You also will need to have been verified on Discord for more than five minutes before you're allowed to post messages.

Click on the #Rank-Request-Channel, a sub channel of Lochac.

Type in “?Rank Dragon's Bay” (don't include the quotation marks but **DO** include the apostrophe!).

This will subscribe you to the Dragon's Bay channels:

#dragons-bay-text
#dragons-bay-voice

You will be automatically logged in to the text channel and will need to select the Voice channel on the sidebar to connect to voice functionality.

Click on the cog icon to open your settings so that you can record a button combination/s for your Push-to-Talk function. Push-to-Talk is a requirement in the Lochac Discord server, so it's useful to enable this setting as soon as you can.

To enable Push-To-Talk, click on the “User Settings” button, and in the “Voice & Video” menu check the “Push to Talk” checkbox. The “shortcut” box below this will let you choose which button you will need to push to unmute yourself.

You can find help most of the time in the #troubleshooting-and-faq text channel, or by emailing the Masonry Deputy at masonry@lochac.sca.org.

You can type in ‘?Rank’ to bring up a list of groups you can join, and Aneala's voice and text channels are available for you to subscribe to as well as some speciality interest areas.

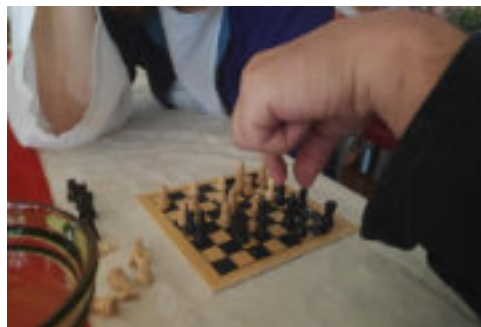
The indoor format kept both combatants and spectators comfortable and provided a novel set up in this new venue.

I was encouraged not to do that for the feast for that event but we had already found and redacted a bunch of recipes that were deemed too amazing to not see the light of day and I really wanted to stop Sivaroobini and Helen from nagging me about when I would use the gnocchi recipe we had redacted at Wednesday night A&S.

When I was approached to do Valentine's Day it seemed the perfect place to utilize these especially as our Baroness loves dancing and would easily have her arm twisted to organize some Italian sets between courses which would fit right in with the theme.

Between being very unwell for a few months, a new job and selling the house, and the start of the ice hockey season (you owe me Josh, Scott and Adam) the rest of the feast did not get my normal level of attention and I didn't produce squat all documentation like I would do for a Roman one.

It is a lot easier to document things when your head and book shelf is already full of the period - and you like the flavors in that arena. I'm really not a fan of rose water and it seems to make an appearance in Everything along with sugar. There was four liters of rose water on the shopping list. (Even if it all didn't make it to the event and Talwen had to do a shop run).

In absolutely amazing timing I had just [bought a book by Shannon Wanty](#) which was redacted and scaled Italian recipes so I was able to flesh out what we had redacted with someone else's hard work and in a VERY unlike me way a couple of the dishes at the event had not had a trial run prior due to my trust in the sources and lack of time.

I was very concerned about the Gnocchi, originally I had been told I'd be looking at 30 odd people but by booking end we had 75 and that's an awful lot of gnocchi to make and a rather time sensitive cooking procedure. The planned ravioli to go with it didn't see the light of day. I tweaked the first remove so that everything else that was being served was all pre cooked and raring to go so the team just had to concentrate on getting the gnocchi cooked and out at the same time. All the gnocchi was made ahead of time and frozen. We had already determined that the pumpkin tart was nicer just warm, than hot or cold so it moved removes.

I have an amazing kitchen team - we had eight pots of water on the stove and a throw the gnocchi in, a scooper out, a production line set up with my lovely Hill teenagers all lined up with bowls, a cheese applier and we had that gnocchi on every table with in minutes straight from the pot.

The Gluten free version tasted nicer and held its shapes much better....but then a modern palette is more attuned to potatoe gnocchi rather than a flour based one. Considering potato flour is the major contributor to Gluten free flour it wasn't surprising.

In my opinion Considering the volume of verjuice and rose water the beef dish tasted bloody amazing, and it had the most feed back that made it to the kitchen. This is always my meter for a good dish, because if people want to leave the table to come tell you something tastes nice it must be a fabulous dish. I didn't cook it as presented in the book and had it in slow cookers, I also changed the broth to a gravy as my platter arrangement wouldn't support it.

Dessert didn't quite go to plan, my local Italian shop had run out of quince paste and I ran out of time to locate some so the wafers ended up with strawberry jam on them instead. I had planned to slice the paste really thinly and cut out in the shape of hearts to place on top of the cream to further the theme so I was quite disappointed that this wasn't possible but no one was complaining (or everyone's smart enough not to cause I'm a scary bitch)

All in all considering my lack of attention to the feast I'm quite stocked with the outcome. Several people have asked for recipes, I'm more than happy to share mine, but considering some are from a commercial book by a fellow SCA member I don't feel it appropriate to share those without Shannon's approval - [I'm sure she will provide a link to her Etsy page though.](#)

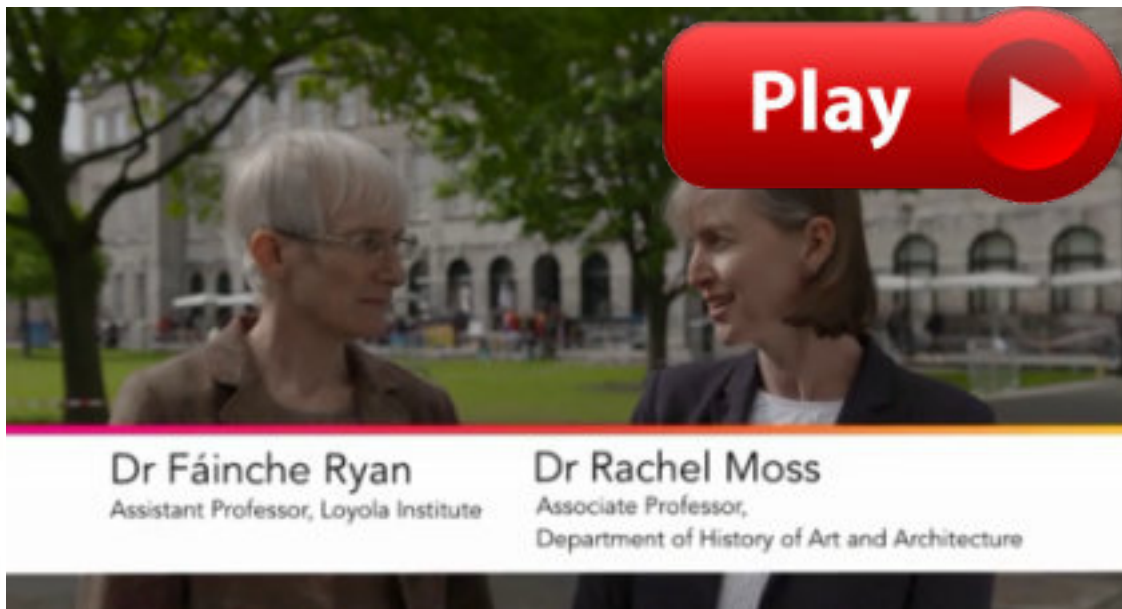

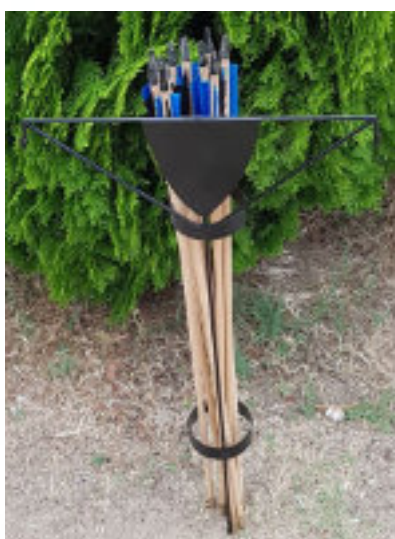
