

Fencing Armour Changes

I am pleased to announce that the necessary Boards, Committees, Kings and Seneschals have all given their approval to permanently change the Lochac Fencing Combat Handbook to permanently remove the requirement to armour 10cm down the inner thigh.

This rule will now be promulgated through Pegasus, to group marshals, changing the Handbook, and will be announced at court, which are all requirements to make this change permanent.

In the meantime, the SCALA Board and SCANZ Committee have approved an extension of the grace period to 28 February 2023, to allow for the promulgation to take place.


No action needs to be taken by fencers. Your current legal armour remains legal and does not need to be changed.



The Development of Shields


SCA member Rolf Warming's revised chronological overview of main shield technologies in Scandinavia, recently published in Herbert Schmidt's brand new book, The Medieval and Renaissance Buckler. The book is available here, for those who may be interested: https://www.amazon.de/dp/3951981776?ref = pe 3052080 397514860).

One of the most interesting findings was the clearer perception of the use of the round shield within the Scandinavian region.

Although most famously known from Viking Age burials, the earliest finds of the round shield type in Scandinavia stem from the Roman Iron Age weapon deposits at Illerup Ådal in Denmark (early 3rd century AD). The round shield continues to assume the role as the dominant shield type in the following centuries, appearing in a variety but closely related versions. To encapsulate this general approach of constructing shields in the region, Rolf Warming has coined the phrase "the Germanic flat round shield tradition".

It is well-known that the round shield is replaced by the kite shield as the dominant shield type on the battlefield towards the end of the Viking Age (as seen, for instance, on the Bayeux Tapestry, dated to c.1070), yet round shields seemingly continue in widespread use in battles for some time.


For how long? That has been a challenging question to answer, but, according to the new research, the historical, archaeological and iconographic sources point toward the 3rd quarter of the 13th century. As such, the Germanic flat round shield tradition can be considered an over 1000-year-old weaponry tradition!

Sigurd the Dragon Slaver



This illustration displays some typical characteristics of figurative motifs from early Medieval Scandinavia rendered in Ringerike style. Eight stones are known to display carvings depicting the legend of Sigurd the Dragon Slayer. All of them are found in Sweden, the earliest dating to the eleventh century. The legend of Sigurd features in Nordic and Continental Germanic tradition including the Nibelungenlied, the Völsunga saga and Snorri's Edda.

The Völsunga saga featuring Sigurd, the dragon slayer, was popular in the Viking Age. Scenes from the story are depicted on several Gotland picture stones and multiple runestones. Especially the event of Sigurd slaying the dragon is prevalent among the Völsunga saga runestone depictions.

Although the events of the saga take place centuries before the Viking Age, while Scandinavia was heathen, it is still exceptionally popular and prominently featured on Christian stones raised after the conversion.

The fact that the Völsunga saga revolves around heathen deities and mythological themes and figures was apparently unproblematic in post-conversion Scandinavia. However, this might be possible because the central figures of the saga break with old traditions in the narrative. It was, perhaps, even possible to see Sigurd acting as a symbol of Saint Michael's dragon killing.

Aneala Schembart Carnival

In the city of Nuremberg, the Schembart Carnival ("bearded-mask" carnival) was celebrated yearly from 1449 to 1539. Originating with a dance through the streets, the carnival grew more and more elaborate and popular, adding masks, parades, outlandish costumes, sword games and huge themed floats on sleds or wheels.

Join us in the park at Midsummer for Aneala's Schembart Carnival, where there will be plentiful and delicious street food, masks, games, dancing and mischief. A competition open to all will choose the Monarch of Misrule; another will choose the Mini Monarch of Misrule. There will probably be a rapier tournament and may or may not be flaming artichokes.

Participants are reminded that if they are unwell or showing cold or flu-like symptoms, they must not attend.
